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

The Rendezvous officially opened later in the afternoon with a welcome reception on the Forge Motel overlook. It was a reunion of old friends and several new faces. Many who reconvene annually describe the afternoon and evening affair as their favorite night of the summer.

The Mountainside Smokehouse & Grill provided a sumptuous variety of pulled chicken, roasted turkey, beef brisket, macaroni and cheese, baked beans, and summer squash. Decadent specialty cakes of several flavors were made by local baker Kristen Armendola.

No one left the show hungry unless they were too busy socializing and forgot to get a plate. It was truly an amazing day to kick off the weekend.

Early Saturday morning the waterfront was buzzing with show preparation activity, summer sun and heat. Although the

The center entrance to the show this year was a dazzling display of four mahogany beauties including a 26 foot pre-war Chris-Craft triple cockpit, a 26 foot Contemporary Gold Cup Racer, a 20 foot Chris-Craft resto-mod, and post-war Chris-Craft Special runabout.

Making way past these and turning in either direction, viewers were treated to a diversity of antique and classic vessels of all types like never before. There were several land displays to showcase boat brokerage services, restoration services and much more.

The Adirondack Chapter-sponsored *Adironduck* was giving rides while promoting personal flotation device safety to youth and families.

At the same time Dunn's Boat service provided free rides to people of all ages aboard their 1955 Chris-Craft *Grace*.

The Old Forge American Legion served barbecued food and cold drinks that visitors enjoyed with live music.

Weekend Event Schedule

FRIDAY

9 AM – Noon: Bring your boat by water or trailer or a casual public viewing at either docks at Bolton Landing's Rogers Park or the Hague Park & boat ramp and docks on Rt. 9N

3 – 5 PM: Bring your trailered boat down to the blocked off lane of Beach Road along the Lake George Village docks for a mini land display 5 – 8 PM: Welcome cocktail / hors d' oeuvres gathering at the beautiful Fort William Henry Hotel. Come and catch up on old friendships and start new ones.

SATURDAY

7AM – 9:30AM: Exhibitors arrive and are guided by our seasoned Rendezvous dock crew to their assigned slip in the water or to their land space. Captains pick up their show packet, including a member gift at the registration tent.

10AM – 4 PM: Spectators arrive to our 49th Annual Main Event at the Lake George Village Docks on Beach Rd. Children get free boat rides in our Adironduck.

3:15-4:00PM: Spectators look forward to hearing the rumbling start of the boat engines and watching them take off from the docks before circling back to the crowd.

4:30 – 6:30PM: Conclude the weekend at the Fort William Henry Hotel, walking distance across Beach Rd from the docks, for a casual Awards dinner. Adirondack Chapter Holds First Capital Region Event

The Ravena Coeymans Yacht Club (RCYC) on the Hudson River was the host site for the first public show and workshop in the Capital Region by the Adirondack Chapter.

The day began with a lecture on solar boats presented by Captain David Borton a retired PhD professor from Rensselaer Polytech Institute.

Dr. Borton has cruised the length of the Erie canal hauling commercial cargo and the making Alaskan Inside Passage as a pleasure cruise with his son Eric, all the way using only solar power.

He shared images of his boats and scenic places along the way as he provided technical information on the use of solar panels, batteries and three-phase electric motors to efficiently cruise some 50-plus miles each day with nothing but power from the sun – not even with any help from shore power!

Borton was joined by his wife Harriet who helps him remember details during his technical lectures and who he affectionately refers to as his "Memory Stick."

After lunch there were talks presented by Adirondack Chapter members on three barn finds of aluminum, wood and fiberglass, all with the theme question of "what have I gotten myself into?"

Andy Ellis led off with an aluminum Feather Craft boat from the 1950s. He discussed aluminum construction and repairs with riveting and riveting tools.

We learned that the rivets used are the aircraft type and that riveting is a two person job, with one person on the inside and the other outside.

We also learned that aluminum restorations are straightforward compared to wood hull restorations and that there is a lot of information available on Feather Crafts, as they were quite popular and plentiful in the 1950s. Continued on next page









Neil Satterly picked up with a surveyor's review of a 1922 foot Cruise-Along plywood boat that was found in the original owner's barn recently. Decades of proper storage prevented its demise. Plywood boats and especially plywood cruisers typically have not fared as well in storage as their carvel and lapstrake constructed counterparts, but this one did well.

There were of course several exceptions pointed out which segued into a Q&A of whether it would be worth investing in major repairs. Materials costs, market values, sentimental values were all highlighted. Membership in the ACBS was discussed for providing a network of knowledge and support.



The final barn find discussion was fiberglass - a rare 1965 Chris-Craft Corsair with a "swivel drive" I/O and a 302 Ford Interceptor motor.

Adam Weisburgh talked about this boat's features which make it a rare find with its own set of challenges for restoration.

Adam pointed to the resources of the Mariner's Museum in providing technical information on this model and the *Essential Guide to Chris-Craft* hardcover book, for background on the number built and the options offered during this model's production run.

Several other boats were displayed under cover along with many outboard motors. RCYC members were on hand to make us feel very welcome with a food concession, opening their clubhouse for the solar lecture and bathrooms.

The Club grounds are an excellent venue for this type of event, and we look forward toward returning in the future.

Thank you to the ACBS members who attended with their boats or just made the visit to be supportive.


